1. Title: "But What if Someone Needs it?": The Future of Library Collections at Wallace Library

Through many years of conscientious selection and purchasing the Wallace Library has developed a robust collection of print resources to support the curricular needs of the College. However, while acquisitions have seen dedicated staff time and involvement, collection maintenance, or removal of resources that no longer have value to the curriculum and the College, has been neglected. But in order to continue acquiring new materials, space limitations make it imperative that we remove items that are no longer used or circulated. "Weeding" or deaccessioning selected items from a library collection is a fraught conversation on any campus but with the Wallace Library print monograph collection at full capacity and impeding the ability to purchase new material, the maintenance cannot be deferred any longer. The library has access to an analytics tool, GreenGlass, to aid in making collection maintenance decisions and seeks faculty feedback on the criteria that will be applied to various call number ranges for making these decisions.

Objectives:

- 1. Share the draft of the library collection development policy and solicit faculty feedback
- 2. Provide an overview of collection analysis tool GreenGlass and discuss the planned criteria for de-selecting material from the collection and the proposed scope and timeline of that work
- 3. Discuss options for gathering faculty input on ongoing collection development and faculty priorities for resources
